Minor Changes the Rules of Carry on for B.A. LL.B. & LL.B. Course as per decided by the BoS in Law dated on 08.04.2025.

- **No student shall be admitted to the examination unless the student fulfils the norms given in academic progression rule as follows :**
1. For BA LLB course for 1st, 2nd 3rd and 4th semester there shall be complete carry on. However, for appearing the examination of 5th semester the student must have cleared 1st and 2nd semester. Further there shall be complete carry on for 5th , 6th 7th and 8th semester . However, the student shall not be allowed to appear for the 9th semester unless he/ she clears all semesters till 6th semester. students final result will not be declared unless student clears all the semesters till 10th semester.
 2. For LLB course unless the student clear all the papers till 2nd semester student shall not be given admission in 5th semester. students final result will not be declared unless student clears all the semesters till 6th semester.
 3. For the BA. LLB program the maximum period for completion will be of 8 years from the date of admission for the program and for the LLB 3 years program the maximum period for completion will be of 5 years from the date of admission during which if the student could not complete the program the student has to take fresh admission to the program from 1st year.
